## **Special Fund:**

In this fund the money is collected from the following heads:

- 1. Donation for specific purposes including endowments for chairs, scholarships, prizes and medals including interest.
- 2. Deposit funds like GIS, Teachers Welfare Fund, Caution Money, Security Deposit etc.
- 3. Special Fee like game fee, common room, educational tour fee, etc.
- 4. Departmental special fund comprising of income generated by Computer Centre, Bharat Kala Bhawan, Revolving funds of S.S. Hospital, Consultancy Fee etc.
- 5. The collection under the accounts are to be utilized only for specific purposes and its expenditure is to be regulated within the income.

## **Project Fund:**

Financial support from U.G.C. and other agencies such as Department of Bio-chemistry Department of Science & Technology, ICAR, CSIR etc. for specific purposes viz.,

- 1. Research Project
- 2. Travel Grant
- 3. Seminar & Conferences
- 4. Scholarships.

## **General Development Fund:**

- 1. U.G.C. grants to the department for development under plan periods in respects of building, equipments, furniture etc. under HEFA.
- 2. U.G.C. assistance for strengthening of infrastructure for selected departments under KAYAKALP scheme.
- 3. U.G.C. grant for introduction of certain specified courses.
- 4. Grants to cater needs of SC, ST, EWS, Women and differently abled persons.

The University submits proposal to the funding agencies, which examine the proposals either directly or through expert committees.

Academic contributions of BHU teachers have been variously recognized. Several teachers have been elected as Fellows of reputed Academies (i.e. Indian Academy of Sciences, National Academy of Sciences, and National Academy of Medical Sciences). Fellowship and Associate ship were awarded to several teachers to undertake advanced research abroad (e.g. Alexander von Humboldt Fellowship, Germany; INSA-DFG Fellowship, Germany; Fulbright-Nehru Visiting Lecturer Fellowship). Other recognitions include office-bearers of professional organizations, Chairmanship/ President ship /Research Paper National & International/Total Monographs/ Manuals/Leaflets/ Learned Bodies and Conferences, membership of National/ International Committees, Editorship of Journals etc.

Awards / Fellowships and Recognitions Students from the department have received UGC (NET/JRF) and Rajiv Gandhi National Fellowships. Students from the department have been appointed as Assistant Professors in Various Universities and Colleges.

## Equal Opportunity and Inclusive System & Student Welfare for SC/ST

As per the directives of the University Grants Commission (UGC), New Delhi, a Special Cell for Scheduled Caste (SC) & Scheduled Tribes (ST) has been established under the charge of the Joint Registrar as its Liaison Officer. The Cell monitors the implementation of reservation policy as well as looks after the grievances of the SC & ST employees, students and teachers, and subsequently submits information to the concerned Government Offices from time to time.

Also as per directive of the Hon'ble Vice- Chancellor, BHU following Cells has been constituted:

• SC/ST Grievance Cell at University Level.

- SC/ST Grievance Cell at Faculty Level.
- SC/ST Grievance Cell at Department Level.

## **SC/ST Reservation Policy:**

The mandatory provision for reservation as notified by the UGC/GoI, i.e.,15% for Scheduled Castes and 7.5% for Scheduled Tribes, has been implemented by the university for following purposes:

- Admission in Various Courses
- Allotment of Rooms in Hostels
- Allotment of Quarters for Teaching & Non-teaching Staff
- Recruitment of teaching staff (from Assistant Professor to the level of Professor)
- Recruitment of Non-teaching Staff

## **Standing Committee for SC/ST**

As per order of the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor, BHU the Standing Committee for SC/ST has been reconstituted vide notification no. Sct/II/11-12/288 dated 08-10-2011. A Sub-Committee of the Standing Committee for SC/ST has also been constituted under the orders of the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor to look into the doubtful Caste Certificates which are received through Admission Committees of various Departments for their verification and authentication. As per decision of the Sub-Committee, the doubtful Caste Certificates are sent to the Competent Authorities for verification through concern cell.

#### **SC/ST Observers**

For the safeguard of the interests of the SC & ST community, the University nominates SC / ST teaching staff as observer from the SC/ST teachers list in various committees like Admission/Appointment/Promotion and Hostel Allotment Committees, which is published by the Cell every year.

## **Grievance Redressal Cells**

Vide notification dated 11 May, 2013 the Hon"ble Vice Chancellor has constituted three level (University Level, Faculty Level and Department Level) SC/ST Grievance Cell for speedy redressal of the grievances of teachers, employees and students of the SC/ST community.

## **Special Cell for OBC**

As per directives of the UGC to monitor the implementation of reservation policy, a Special Cell for OBC under the charge of Jt. Registrar as its Liaison Officer has also been established and operational in the University vide notification no. R/GAD/Creation of Cells/6699dated11-05-2013.

## **OBC** Reservation

The mandatory provision of reservation of 27% for the OBC Category, as notified by the UGC/GOI has also been adopted/implemented by the University for the following purposes:

- Admission in various courses
- Recruitment of Teaching Posts(upto the level of Assistant Professor)
- Recruitment of Non-teaching posts

## **Disability Cell**

In terms of letter No. F.6-1/2002(CPC-II) dated 2<sup>nd</sup> March, 2005 received from the Dy. Secretary, UGC, New Delhi vide notified vide no. R/GAD/I-Disability Unit/26377 dated 22.09.2006a "Disability Cell" has been established in the University for implementation of the provisions of Act regarding persons with disabilities under the charges of an officer of rank of the Joint Registrar as its Liaison

Officer. As of Govt. of India policy 4% percent horizontal reservation is provided to disabled persons for recruitments of teaching & non-teaching positions and as per office memorandum No.36035/02/2017-Estt (Res) dated 15.01.2018.5% percents reservation are provided in admissions of various courses offers by the University, other related relaxations are also provided to disabled persons as per directive of the govt. of India.

## **Equal Opportunity Cell**

The Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor has nominated the Dy. Registrar, SC/ST Cell as In charge of Equal Opportunity Cell (E.O.C.) (letter no. R/dev/merged scheme/EOC/4174 dated 29.03.2010) at present the In charge of Equal Opportunity Cell is an officer of the university of the rank of the Joint Registrar.

## **Grievance Redressal Officer (EWS)**

As per directives of the UGC vide notification no. EWS/GRO-Notification/ERP 2020-00039/4418dated 26.02.2021, the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor, has appointed Prof. Bibha Tripathi, faculty of Law, as Grievance Redressal Officer (GRO), Economically Weaker Section (E.W.S.) Cell of the Banaras Hindu University.

## "Annadan Scheme "for economically weaker and meritorious students

Under the aegis of Shri Vishawanath Temple, BHU, "Annadan Scheme" was initiated in the year 2003. Under this scheme, economically weaker and meritorious students are provided free food during the period from 2<sup>nd</sup> October to 30<sup>th</sup> April of an academic session. ## **Salary Section - (R.O. - Finance)**

## The work related to Salary Section is described below:-

This section deals with adherence to Rules of salary to all the Teaching & Non-Teaching employees involving Revenue Account and Development Grant. In this connection the bills are received from the respective departments and distributed among the task holders based on allocation of departments. With reference to the Rules on release of salary, the bills are processed. After completion of the process, the consolidated cheque is prepared and forwarded to the respective Bank for crediting the salary in the respective accounts of the employees concerned. In addition, the bills on the following transactions are processed by the Salary Section:-

- ➤ Leave Encashment for 300 days
- Leave Encashment for 10 days on Leave Travel Concession (LTC)
- > Tuition Fee reimbursement
- > Extra duty remuneration
- > Conveyance allowance
- ➤ Honorarium to Guest Teacher/ Retired Teachers
- > RTI replies are also processed.

## Who is a Foreign National Student?

The terms "International Students" and "Foreign National Students" referred to those students who come from abroad, non-domestic, cross-border, overseas students, of students from other countries will be hereafter encompassed by the term "Foreign National Students."

## **Foreign Student Criteria:**

The citizens of all countries other than India, who are not of Indian origin as defined under the Person of Indian Origin (PIO). Any foreign national with a valid passport and Indian students whose parents are currently working abroad with a valid work VISA shall be considered as a Foreign National for admissions. For admission in Banaras Hindu University, Foreign / Non-Resident Indian (NRI) category seats are available only for:

- Foreign Nationals
- Candidates with NRI status
- Overseas Citizenship of India (OCI)
- Person of Indian Origin (PIO)
- Tibetan Refugee
- Child of an Indian worker in the Gulf and Overseas

#### Note:

Candidates from Iran: Required to submit the No Objection Certificate, issued by the Embassy of the Islamic Republic of Iran in India, for granting admission to the course of this University.

## **Indian Government Requirements and Portals**

As per the Government of India rules, foreign nationals should register themselves within 14 days of their arrival in India as bonafide students with the local FRO/FRRO (e-FRPO Portal-https://indianfrro.gov.in/eservices/), failing which they have to face legal consequences and monetary penalties. Hence, after completion of the admission process, they will be issued bonafide student certificate and other required documents upon request so that they can register themselves in the FRO/FRRO as early as possible.

"The e-FRRO involves completely online application submission and document upload, for which no facilitation is required by any intermediary/agents, etc. The foreign nationals are required to apply online by themselves. It is advised not to believe or fall into the trap of any middlemen/agents that claim a speedy/express grant of e-FRRO and charge money for it. For any clarification or doubt, you may contact the FRRO Support Centre."

- ➤ International students holding an OCI card are exempted from FRRO registration. However, such students must have
- Form C, generated by an Indian citizen/owner of the residence providing accommodation. No student can generate Form C on his/her own.
- Form S, provided by the International Centre of the Banaras Hindu University.
- > Details are available at https://indianfrro.gov.in/frro/FormC/menuuserreg.jsp
- OCI-Registration is an online process and available at https://ociservices.gov.in/capchaAction
- As per the Government of India rules the foreign nationals should register themselves at the 'Study in India' portal (https://studyinindia.gov.in). The Study in India (SII) programme is a flagship initiative launched by the Ministry of Education (MoE), Government of India, that integrates dynamic features including student registration, generation of Unique Student ID, online application submission, visa processing and FRRO application process.
- ➤ The program aims to position India as a leading educational destination for international students, inviting them to pursue higher education in the country. With its array of compelling features, the program offers international students the opportunity to experience the best of Indian education. It encourages students from around the world to explore valuable educational prospects offered by top universities in India.
- ➤ The added advantage of the Study in India Programme is quality assurance, wherein it partners up with institutes which fulfil at least one of these listed Institute Eligibility criteria:
- ➤ Listed/ figured in the NIRF
- A valid NAAC score of 3.01 on a scale of 4.0
- > Institutes granted the status of Institution of National Importance or Institute of Eminence
- Listed in QS World Ranking Asia 2024 onwards
- Accorded Autonomous Status by any statutory bodies, Ministries viz., MHA, AICTE, UGC, NMC, NCI, etc., of the Government of India.
- ➤ Institutions with 80% admissions consecutively for the last 5 Academic Years.

## **Residential Permit**

- ➤ The residential permit will be issued by the concerned FRRO for a period of a maximum of one year or the visa expiry date, whichever is earlier.
- Residential permit / stay visa shall be renewed/extended at least one month before the expiry of the current RP/RC/Stay Visa. The students have to comply with the same.
- Any change in residential address/course/college/passport of the international student should be registered online immediately by the student concerned.
- ➤ International Students have to submit a copy of the RC/RP to the Office of the International Students Office, BHU, at the time of Admission.

#### Note:

- ➤ District authorities concerned expect the international students to obey the law of the land, as any negligence in this regard will be dealt with by the authorities as per law.
- ➤ If the passport of an international student is lost, a complaint should be registered immediately at a concerned police station. Further, such a student is advised to approach the concerned embassy to obtain temporary passport facilities.
- > Overstaying by international students beyond the permissible limit is not allowed.

## **Travel**

- ➤ No international student can travel abroad / within India without a valid Residential Permit (RC/RP)
- ➤ Students need to produce a Residential Permit (RC/RP) at the time of departure/arrival, wherever such travel documents are required.
- > Students need to surrender the Residential Permit (RC/RP) to the immigration officer at the concerned airports at the time of final departure on course completion.

## **Eligibility Criteria (Language Required)**

An English Proficiency certificate of Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) (minimum 70 marks) or International English Testing System (IELTS) (minimum 6 bands) score may be required for foreign candidates at the time of submission of the application form.

## **Examining Bodies**

International Boards: The eligibility is based on the qualifications recognised by the Association of Indian Universities (AIU), New Delhi. Refer to **https://aiu.ac.in/** for a full list of foreign qualifications equivalent to the Pre-University or 12th Grade qualification of India, for admission in Indian Universities.

## **General Qualifications**

Candidates seeking admission to Undergraduate (UG) / Postgraduate (PG) / Diploma/Certificate should have obtained their qualifications from a recognised Board / University. For PG programs, the candidates MUST have a Bachelor's degree of 3/4 years' duration from a recognised University as per the program requirement. Candidates with Foreign qualifications must submit an equivalency certificate from the Association of Indian Universities (AIU), New Delhi, as per program requirements. Refer to https://aiu.ac.in/ for more details.

- > The University will acknowledge only the actual amount received, and any shortfall must be paid by the applicant.
- ➤ Once the payment is credited to the University's bank account, you will be issued an Admission Letter, which can be used to apply for a student visa to study in India.

**Important:** If the conditions outlined in the Offer Letter are not fulfilled, and the signed "Acceptance of Offer Letter" is not submitted before the admission deadline as listed on the university website, the admission will not be confirmed, unless otherwise decided by the University.

## **Important Notes on Admission**

- Admission for Foreign Nationals is dynamic; priority given to ICCR and other government scholarship holders.
- Admission to all courses is subject to meeting eligibility criteria.
- Remaining seats after scholarship admissions will be filled based on merit determined by the concerned Faculty/Department.
- ➤ No requests for change of course/subject or refund of processing fees will be entertained.
- Existing fees/charges are subject to revision.
- Submission of application does not guarantee admission until eligibility conditions are met.
- Full attendance is expected during the academic session.
- ➤ Hostel accommodation is not guaranteed, subject to availability.

## **Instructions to Students After Getting Admission Letter**

- ➤ Complete all necessary formalities in your country and procure a Student Visa (Research Visa for Ph.D. students). OCI Ph.D. students MUST obtain a Letter of Permission from the Ministry of Home Affairs, GOI.
- Enrol preferably within one month of admission, and must enrol within the eligibility period (usually two terms).
- ➤ **Report IN PERSON** to the International Centre, BHU, Varanasi with the following **ORIGINAL** documents (and several photocopies):
- Eligibility letter for Admission from BHU.
- > Proof of Age / PASSPORT with copies / Passport size photographs.
- ➤ Marksheets/Certificates/Transcripts; Migration/Transfer Certificate.
- ➤ Certificate of English Proficiency (TOEFL min 70 or IELTS min 6 for Ph.D., unless qualifying exam was in English).
- Valid Student Visa or Research Visa (endorsed for BHU) OR Letter of Permission for OCIs.
- For Nepal & Bhutan nationals: Citizenship Certificate (countersigned by Indian Consular Wing) AND NOC from the Mission (for Ph.D.).
- For Iranian Nationals: NOC from the Islamic Republic of Iran in India (plus Visa).

- ➤ Undergo a medical HIV test. Being HIV-positive may result in denial of admission as per GOI guidelines.
- > Obtain a Certificate of Clearance from the International Centre after the HIV test.
- Take the Clearance Certificate to your Faculty/Department for verification of original academic records and application form details. The department will issue an Admit Card for provisional admission.
- ➤ Report to the Dean/Head/Coordinator/Principal with fee receipts to enter your name in the records. Obtain and sign your Identity Card (Day Scholars need City Delegation signature). Carry your ID card at all times.
- Enrol with the University online via the BHU website. Complete the Registration and Enrolment Form, upload a photo, print it, get it signed by your Dean/Principal/Head/Coordinator, and submit it to the Office of the Controller of Examinations to get your Enrolment Number (within 3-5 days). Enter this number on your ID card.
- ➤ Apply for library, medical, computer, WiFi, and hostel facilities (subject to availability) at the respective University units.

# Register with the Varanasi FRO (Foreigners Registration Office) within ten days of admission.

- ➤ Complete Online Form C (Arrival Report of Foreigner), get a Bonafide Student's Certificate from your Faculty/Department/Hostel Warden, and submit it to the International Centre for Online Registration.
- ➤ Report to the Assistant Commissioner of Police & LIU and FRO at Kotwali Premises, near G.P.O. Visheshwarganj, Maidagin, Varanasi, as per your Passport, with Form C, BHU paperwork, admission letter, Fee Receipt, Identity Card, and Bonafide Student's Certificate (countersigned by the International Centre).

## Subject: Reiteration of the instructions related to pre-requisites for eBills Usage in PFMS.

It has been observed that some field offices while making use of eBills module of PFMS for treasury operations, report the system to be slow and face issues with system responsiveness. This was particularly during the days leading up to the closure of FY 2023-24. In this regard, reference is drawn to pre-requisites for eBills usage issued vide OM number MF-I-17008/4/2020-CGA/153 dated 16.09.2021, reiterated vide OM No.I-17008/4/2021-CGA(8128)/376 dated 30.03.2022 and the Check list for eBill implementation circulated with the training links (copies enclosed).

- 2. It is once again requested to all Pr. CCAs / CCAs / CAs (IC) to please ensure that the computer systems being used by various users across Program Divisions, Drawing & Disbursing Offices and Pay & Accounts Offices are in line with minimum requirements for computer system configuration as prescribed by aforementioned OMs to avoid facing any performance issues in eBills.
- 3. Furthermore, it has also been noticed that the bandwidth of the internet connection being used for Treasury operations on PFMS by various Ministries / Departments are sub-optimal / shared across large number of users / used for buffering or other high bandwidth requirement tasks. In this regard, it is advisable for all treasury users operating eBills to ensure a moderate to high speed bandwidth broadband connection to avoid any performance issues on eBills.

It is planned to roll out e-Bill in all the Civil Ministries/Departments in the financial year 2022-23 in a phased manner. Currently, the pilot is running in 9 PAOs of selected Ministries and Departments.

The roll out of e-bill requires a set of pre-requisites. These are detailed below: -

#### A. Hardware Requirements:-

## System Related

- (i) Computers 64 bit with Windows 10 and above operating system.
- (ii)Minimum 8 GB RAM and i3 processor, AMD Ryzen 3 or similar
- (111) Microsoft Dot Net Framework 4.6 1 in every system where PFMS is operated
- Window DSC Utility (to be downloaded from PFMS & installed on all systems).
- Il Document Scanner. The document scanner should be capable of scanning at least 72 dpi resolution and should be able to support the page sizes required to be uploaded in e-bill with the following attributes.

The system requires upload of scanned invoices/claims by vendors/suppliers on PFMS through digital signature. However, an option of upload by HoD Authorized (Sanction Maker) user is also configured in the system. Necessary communication in this regard to HoD Authorized (Sanction Maker) users of respective Ministry/Department may also be sent.

- III. <u>Digital Signature Certificates (DSC):-</u> The DSCs can be of same specification as used currently by various PAOs on PFMS. The users already having DSC need not procure the same again. In e-bill model, DSC shall be required for the following users:-
  - (a) Claimant
  - (b) HoD Authorized (Sanction Maker)
  - (c) HoD Authorized (Sanction Checker)
  - (d) DDO
  - (e) NCDDO
  - (f) CDDO- Maker, Checker and Admin
  - (g) NCDDO attached to CDDO Maker, checker and Admin
  - (h) One each for Dealing hand, AAO, PAO, Signatory-1 and Signatory-2
  - (i) One each for Pr.AO Dealing hand, Pr.AO-AAO, Pr.AO (for Inter Government Adjustment Advice purpose).

Digital signatures may be obtained from the Certifying Authority, authorized by the Controller of Certifying Authority of India-https://cca.gov.in/). The OM No. V-12025/1/2021-PFMS/Cyber Security/CN-6609/2781-2834 dated 16/09/2021 and subsequent corrigendum V-12025/1/2021-PFMS/Cyber Security/CN-6609/4630-83 dated 27/10/2021 may also be referred in this regard. (copy enclosed)

In addition to above the facility of e-signing to the vendors is also being provided in e-Bill Module.

- IV. <u>Codification of Program Division in PFMS</u>:-In lines of PAO Codes and DDO Codes in accounting organization, authorized HOD users are also required to be codified. The detailed guidelines for the codification process are being issued separately.
- General Instructions for E-Bill Pilot:- Keeping in view of the proposed rollout out as above, OM No. TA-2-17002(01)/17/2020-TA-II/(e-4426)/39 dated 01/02/2022 may also be referred for general instructions annexed with Standard Operating Procedure(SOP). Hardware requirements and process flow of E-Bill.
- 4. <u>Training:-</u> This office shall hold comprehensive training in the new e-bill process for all types of users in INGAF/RTCs etc. The calendar in this regard shall be communicated soon. It may be ensured that all concerned officials attend the training.
- 5. All Pr. CCAs/CCAs/CAs with independent charges are, therefore, requested to complete the preparatory work as indicated above and arrange for the readiness to begin pilot roll out in their respective PAOs. They are requested to closely review the preparedness at the level of DDOs and PDs. The communication regarding the selection of PAOs shall be issued soon.

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi (University) as at 31 March 2021, the Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19 (2) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with section 13(1) of the Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi Act, 1915. These financial statements are the responsibility of the University's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (C&AG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & regulations (Propriety and Regulatory) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any are reported through inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.

#### (A.1) Corpus/Capital Fund (Schedule 1)

₹ 3369.74 crore

The University has shown accumulated depreciation of ₹835.87 crore in as 'Depreciation Reserve Fund' under Corpus/Capital Fund and assets has been depicted at its historical value in Balance Sheet. However, creation of depreciation reserve fund is in contravention of the Format. This resulted in overstatement of 'Corpus/Capital Fund' and 'Fixed Assets' by ₹ 835.87 crore. The University also needs to reconcile the Depreciation fund prior to 01.04.2013.

- (A.2) An amount of ₹67.03 crore related to designated/earmarked fund were reflected under "Corpus/Capital Fund" instead of "Designated/Earmarked/Endowment Fund". This resulted overstatement of "Corpus/Capital Fund" and understatement of "Designated/Earmarked/ Endowment Fund" by ₹ 67.03crore.
- (B) General

No provision was made for retirement benefit on actuarial basis by the University as required in AS-15.

## (C) Grants-In-Aid

The University received Grant-in-aid of ₹ 1414.33 Crore (Receipt during the year ₹ 1352.33 crore + Adjustment ₹ 62.00 crore) after taking opening balance of ₹ 81.67 Crore, the total fund available workout to ₹ 1495.99 Crore. Out of which the University incurred an expenditure of ₹ 1413.21 Crore (Refund to UGC ₹ 5.29 crore + Utilised for capital expenditure ₹ 119.84 crore + Utilized for Revenue Expenditure ₹ 1288.04 crore), leaving a closing balance of ₹ 82.78 Crore as on 31<sup>st</sup> March 2021.

(v) Subject to our observation in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet and Income & Expenditure Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.



## (A.1) Fixed Assets (Schedule-4)

Rs. 2946.17 crore

As per MHRD format Fixed Assets are to be depicted at Net Value. It is noticed that the University has depicted Fixed Assets amounting to Rs. Rs. 2946.17 crore, at Gross value and has not charged depreciation amounting to 1059.64 crore(including previous years). This resulted in overstatement of the "Corpus/Capital Fund" and "Fixed Assets" by Rs. 1059.83 crore each.

## (A.2) Current Liabilities and Provisions (Schedule-3)

Rs. 589.51 crore

The above does not include Central Hindu Boys' Hostel's caution money amounting to Rs. 1.64 lakh and Working Women's Hostel caution money amounting to Rs. 4.62 lakh, instead these have been shown in 'Academic Receipts' and 'Other Income' respectively. This resulted in understatement of 'Current Liability and Provisions' by Rs. 6.26 lakh and overstatement of Earmarked Fund by the same amount.

## (B) Income & Expenditure Account

## (B.1) Other Income (Schedule-13)

Rs. 178.69 crore

The University has shown Interest received on 'Ayurvedic Pharmacy Fund' and 'Security Deposit' amounting to Rs. 57.93 lakh in 'Other Income (Schedule-13)' instead of showing it in 'Income from Investment (Schedule-11)'. This resulted in overstatement of Other Income by Rs. 57.93 lakh and understatement of Income from Investment by the same amount.

## (B.2) Administrative and General Expenses (Schedule-17)

Rs. 188.25 crore

The University has shown payment of contractual staff, outsourced staff, muster roll staff, security staff etc. amounting to Rs. 103.02 crore in Establishment Expenses instead of Administrative and General Expenses. This resulted in overstatement of Establishment Expenses by Rs. 103.02 crore and understatement of Administrative and General Expenses by the same amount.

#### (C) General

- (C.1) The University has not included Rs. 54.52 lakh in the annual account incurred for purchase of two CNG buses for Central Hindu Girls School which is under the jurisdiction of the University. The University needs to include the same in the annual account and the effect of depreciation should be incorporated suitably.
- (C.2) The University is charging depreciation on Sports Equipment at the rate of 7.5 per cent instead of 8 per cent. The University needs to recalculate the depreciation at the rate of 8 per cent and incorporate it suitably in the annual account.
- (C.3) The University is charging depreciation on pro-rata basis on additions during the year whereas as per Format it is to be charged for the whole year on addition during the year. The University needs to recalculate the depreciation and incorporate it suitably.
- (C.4) The University has shown Rs. 20.37 lakh in the annual accounts as expenses incurred on purchase of Library Books, Scientific journals and E-journals which don't reconcile with the records of the Central Library The difference so occurred remained un-reconciled by the University.
- (C.5) The University has deposited Rs. 8.68 crore with UPPCL as 'Security Deposit' but the same has neither been accounted in the annual account nor depicted in Notes to account.

The University has not mentioned the following information in Notes on Accounts as prescribed in Format

- (vi) Collection on account of development charges and expenditure thereon
- (vii) Collection for medical expenses and expenditure thereon
- (viii) Compliance with statutory dues like EPF and ESI
- (ix) Salary structure of teachers.

Grant in ald (E)

(E.1) The University received Grants-in-aid Rs. 2293.34 crore. After taking opening balance of

Rs. 149.33 crore and Rs. 1.62 crore received on account of adjustment, the total funds available

worked out to Rs. 2444.29 crore. It incurred an expenditure of Rs. 2289.70 crore and refunded

Rs. 59.94 crore, leaving a closing balance of Rs. 94.65 crore as at 31st March 2023.

(E.2) Project Fund: The University received Rs. 104.19 crore and after taking opening balance

of Rs. 37.83 crore, the total funds available worked out to Rs. 142.02 crore. It utilized Rs. 113.24

crore leaving a closing balance of Rs. 28.78 crore as at 31st March 2023.

Subject to our observation in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance (v)

Sheet and Income & Expenditure Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the

books of accounts.

given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes

on Accounts, and subject to the significant matter stated above and other matters mentioned in

the Annexure to this Audit Report give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting

We have audited the Annual Accounts of the Banaras Hindu University for the year 2023-24 and have issued the Audit Report. Following deficiencies, observed during the course of audit which has not been included in the Separate Audit Report, is being brought to your kind notice for remedial/corrective action:

#### General

- (i) The University has depicted Rs. 8.63 crore additions to Designated/ Earmarked/ Endowment Funds under 'Grants Received From Other Sources Rs. 23.90 crore'. The University has to show it separately under 'Receipts against Earmarked/ Endowment Funds' which has been shown as nil. The University needs to depict the same correctly.
- (ii) The University has included a sum of Rs. 12.14 lakh pertaining to maintenance of Rajiv Gandhi South Campus-UWD (Other expense) and Horticulturist in Academic Expenses (Schedule-16) instead of Repair and Maintenance (Schedule-19).

- (iii) The University has paid Rs. 72,790.00 as book binding charges but not included the same in Repair & Maintenance (Schedule-19) as bookbinding charges. The University needs to incorporate the same in the accounts suitably.
- (iv) The University could not submit its annual account by 30th June for audit, which is in contravention of Rule 237(I) of General Financial Rules, 2017.
- (v) Significant Accounting Policles (Schedule-23)

#### 5. Stocks:

The inventory has not been maintained for stationaries. Moreover, the closing stock is not setup as inventory as on 31st March, 2024. The University needs to align its significant accounting policy for stocks as prescribed in Ministry of Education format.

Further, in respect of comment (B.1) of the SAR, the University is suggested to open an appropriate sub head of account for Domestic Travel Expenses under CoA Academic expenses so that DTA etc. of external examiners if any may be appropriately booked from the accounts of the year 2024-25 onwards.

As for the issues pointed out in comments (A), (B.2), (C.2) and (E.4) of the SAR, it is expected that the University may pass the appropriate entries of rectification in the annual accounts for the year 2024-25 and communicate to this office before finalising the annual accounts for the year 2024-25.

Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the Accounts of the Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi for the year ended 31 March, 2024

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi (University) as at 31 March 2024, the Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller & Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with section 13(1) of the Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi Act, 1915. These financial statements are the responsibility of the University's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India (C&AG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & regulations (Propriety and Regulatory) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects etc., if any are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
- 4. Based on our audit, we report that:
- (i) We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
- (ii) The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format of financial statement prescribed for Central Higher Educational Institutions by the Ministry of Human Resource Development (format) approved, Government of India;

- (iii) In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the University as required under section 13(1) of the Banaras Hindu University Act, 1915 in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.
- (iv) We further report that:

#### (A) Balance Sheet

#### **Fixed Assets (Schedule-4)**

Rs. 2326.30 crore

The above included 191.96 crore being unutilized advance paid to CPWD for construction works, which should have been reflected under Loans, Advances & Deposits (Schedule-8) However, the same has been capitalized and accounted as Fixed Assets. This resulted in overstatement of Fixed Assets by Rs. 191.96 crore and understatement of Loans, Advances & Deposits by the same amount.

## (B) Income & Expenditure Account

## (B.1) Administrative and General Expenses (Schedule-17)

Rs. 344.48 crore

The above includes Rs. 65.31 lakh being Domestic Travel expenses to Controller of Examination under 'Travelling and Conveyance Expenses' which should have been shown under 'Examination' in Academic Expenses (Schedule-16). This resulted in overstatement of Administrative and General Expenses by Rs. 65.31 lakh and understatement of Academic Expenses to the same extent.

## (B.2) Finance Costs (Schedule-20)

Rs. 105.32 crore

As per AS-16, the borrowing cost of any loan taken for construction of a qualifying asset should be considered for capitalisation. However, the interest amount of Rs. 6.20 crore paid to Higher Education Financing Agency (HEFA) loan has been accounted as revenue expenditure and taken in 'Finance Cost'. This resulted in overstatement of 'finance cost', thus understatement of Corpus/Capital fund (Schedule-1) and understatement of fixed assets (Work-In-Progress) by Rs. 6.20 crore each.

# (C) Significant Accounting Policies (Schedule-23)

## (C.1) 2. Revenue Recognition

The University has stated that 'Income from Land, Building and Other Property is accounted on cash basis, which is in contradiction to Ministry of Education format. The format prescribes accounting for these incomes under accrual basis. The University needs

to make necessary changes in its Significant Accounting Policies and incorporate the same suitably in annual accounts.

# (C.2) 8. Earmarked / Endowment Funds:

# 8.1 BHU Capital Fund

BHU Capital Fund was established in 2013-14 with the approval of Executive Council and the same was disclosed as Earmarked / Endowment Fund in Significant Accounting Policies 8.1. The funds were transferred to Capital Fund from free balances of various head under Special Fund. As on 31.3.2024 there is a balance of Rs. 1107.34 crore lying in this fund. However, it is noticed that the same has been accounted in Schedule-1 Corpus Fund instead of Earmarked Fund as disclosed in Significant Accounting Policy. This has resulted in overstatement of Corpus/Capital fund (Schedule-1) by Rs. 1107.34 crore and understatement of Earmarked Fund by the same extent.

#### (C.3) 13. Heritage Assets

The University has shown Heritage Assets (Textiles: 1747, Decorative: 1169, Coins: 36597, Paintings: 12173 and Wooden Block: 375) in the Annual Accounts for the year 2023-24, whereas the quantities for the same in the previous year annual accounts were Textiles: 1815, Decorative: 1419, Coins: 36618, Paintings: 12933 and Wooden Block: 348 only. Thus, there is difference in quantities for which the University has not stated any reason in the aforesaid statement.

## (D) Notes to Accounts (Schedule-24)

The University needs to host the following information in Notes to accounts so as to enable all stakeholders to have a bird's eye view of BHU's capacity and capability:

- (i) No. of students
- (ii) Number of teachers
- (iii) Collection of account of building fund and expenditure thereof
- (iv) Collection for sports activities and expenditure thereof
- (v) Collection for co-curricular activities and expenditure thereof
- (vi) Collection on account of development charges and expenditure thereon
- (vii) Collection for medical expenses and expenditure thereon
- (viii) Compliance with statutory dues like EPF and ESI
- (ix) Salary structure of teachers.

The comment was issued previous year also but no corrective action taken.

#### (E) General

- (E.1) The University has not prepared Schedule-2: Designated/Earmarked/Endowment Funds in the required fund-wise format as prescribed by Ministry of Education. Also, a separate schedule 2A of Endowment Fund as prescribed in the format has not been annexed. The University needs to depict these schedules suitably.
- (E.2) An amount of Rs. 3.78 crore being caution money received from students needs to be depicted separately under the head 'Deposit from Students' in Current liabilities & Provisions (Schedule-3), instead of including the same in Other Deposits (Rs. 207.24 crore) in the same schedule.
- (E.3) The University has shown Rs. 14.26 lakh under value of land in Fixed Assets (Schedule-
- 4). However, it could not be ascertained whether these are Freehold or Leasehold. The University needs to depict distinctively all the Freehold and Leasehold land Properties separately as provided in format.
- (E.4) The University has charged depreciation of Rs. 118.39 crore in the Expenditure side of Income and Expenditure Account and subsequently reversed it by passing a negative entry of the same amount. But again charged the same depreciation amount in Schedule-1: Corpus/Capital Fund which although did not impact the Balance sheet but the procedure adopted is not as per Ministry of Education (MoE) format which needs to be rectified.
- (E.5) The University has not made provisions for retirement benefits based on actuarial valuation as required under AS-15 and MoE format. The University in the SAP 6.2 disclosed that the University provides for the Pension and Gratuity under a defined retirement plan covering eligible employees. It is further stated that based on the actuarial valuation the liability of future gratuity benefits as on 31.1.3 2013 amount to Rs. 161.64 crore. However the funds for creating the provision has not been provided by the UGC/MHRD therefore no such provision has been made. However, for making the provision of retirement funds no such funds are required from UGC/MHRD. The University has made an expenditure of Rs. 385.02 crore and Rs. 471.89 crore on Retirement Benefits during 2023-24 and 2022-23 respectively. Thus, non-provisioning for retirement benefits on actuarial valuation has an impact on surplus/deficit in the annual accounts, consequently impacting Corpus Fund as well as Current Liabilities and Provisions.

(E.6) The University has paid Rs. 28.84 lakh for remuneration for examination and included as Establishment Expenses (Schedule-15) instead of Academic Expenses (Schedule-16). The University needs to rectify the depiction of same.

(E.7) The University has shown Recruitment and Assessment Cell Expenses of Rs. 59.24 lakh under Academic Expenses (Schedule-16) whereas as per format this should have been depicted under Administrative and General Expenses (Schedule-17). This needs to be rectified by the University.

(F) Grants-in-ald

The University received Rs. 2188.84 crore as Grants-in-aid in the year 2023-24. After taking opening balance of Rs. 94.65 crore and Rs. 0.13 crore payments on account of adjustments, the total available funds worked out to Rs. 2283.36 crore. The University could utilize Rs. 2187.68 crore and Rs. 85.79 crore were lapsed/refunded, leaving a closing balance of Rs. 9.89 crore as at 31st March 2024.

(G) Management letter: Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been bought to the notice through a management letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.

Subject to our observation in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet and Income & Expenditure Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.

In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in the Annexure to this Audit Report give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India:

In so for as it relates to Income & Expenditure Account of the 'surplus' for the year ended on that date.







- लाइसेंसधारी द्वारा अपनी दुकान पर कार्य कर रहे वयस्क श्रमिकों के आधार कार्ड की स्व प्रमाणित प्रति उप कुलसचिव/सहा कुलसचिव (संपदा), काशी हिन्दू विश्वविद्यालय के कार्यालय में जमा करनी होगी।



लाइसेंसधारी द्वारा अपनी दुकान पर कार्य कर रहे वयस्क श्रमिकों का चिरत्र प्रमाण पत्र पुलिस विभाग से लेकर उप कुलसचिव/सहायक कुलसचिव (संपदा), काशी हिन्दू विश्वविद्यालय के कार्यालय में जमा करनी होगी।

- सभी श्रमिकों के स्वस्थ होने का प्रमाण पत्र एवं सभी प्रकार के रोग से मुक्त होने का प्रमाण पत्र (किसी एम0बी0बी0एस0 डॉक्टर के द्वारा जारी किया गया हो) उपलब्ध कराना होगा।
- लाइसेंसधारी को अपनी दुकान पर श्रमिको नियुक्त करने तथा नौकरी से हटाने का पूर्ण अधिकार होगा परंतु श्रमिकों की नियुक्ति में किसी भी प्रकार (लिंग, धर्म, जाति या सामाजिक आर्थिक आधार पर) का भेद नहीं किया जायेगा। ये श्रमिक किसी भी अवस्था में काशी हिन्दू विश्वविद्यालय के कर्मचारी नहीं माने जाएंगे।



Guest House Complex is privileged for extending its hospitality to many national and international high-profile guests who include Hon'ble President of India, Hon'ble Vice President of India, Hon'ble Prime Minister of India, Hon'ble Governors of different states, Chief Ministers of various states and many more. Guest House Complex also has the honour of offering its valuable services to many renowned Bollywood celebrities. University Guest House complex is managed by a professional brigade which consists of a Chief Warden, Wardens, Manager and welltrained professional from all four disciplines namely Front Office, House Keeping, Food Production and Food & Beverage Service personnel. Salaries and wages of Contractual/Out-sourced staff and other maintenance expenditures are met from the Special Revolving fund account of Guest House Complex. University Guest House Complex guest rooms and public areas are well connected with high speed Wi-Fi connection as well. The University Guest House Complex is committed to providing quality services

and hospitality to its guests. Guest's security is also taken care of through CCTV, security guards and staff members.

Gross revenue during 2021-22 of GHC (LD & UGH) was Rs 2,25,14,788/- and total expenditure was Rs. 69,84,738/-.

#### 11.3. Internet and Networking

University has a well-equipped Computer Centre which was established to provide services to the University community in computing facilities and to help researchers get their research data analyzed. Initially the Centre ran a MCA course till the academic session 2005-06, which has later been transferred to the Department of Computer Science from the academic session 2006-07.

The Centre operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. In Dec. 2020, the Centre shifted to the newly built Central Discovery Centre Building of the University. The Computer Centre extends Internet facilities in the University, enabling access to World Wide Web(WWW), Email and Video Conferencing facilities etc. to the faculties and students of the University. The Centre also maintains BHU website (www.bhu. ac.in) and Webservers, DNS. The website information is updated by this Centre as per the request of the respective Academic and Administrative units.

The Computer Centre also maintains the Optical fiber Network which is more than 250 kms in the University Campus. This connects all academic units, administrative offices, Guest Houses and Hostels using Distribution Switches and Access Switches based on World-Class Standards of 3-tier Architecture. This Network is also supported by the Redundant Optical Fiber backbone. Users can avail of the computing resources of Computer Centre from their Academic Units, Offices and Hostels. User Authentication Ids are provided to all the students, faculty members and staff for browsing Internet.

In the academic year 2021-22, the Computer Centre has reported manifold advancement synchronizing with the latest trend of emerging technologies. The following highlights illustrate its success:

- 1. Training Facilities for Smart Classrooms: BHU has procured 125 smart classroom set-ups, which have been installed all across the campus. To provide training at various levels to the different stakeholders of the University, a fully equipped Smart Class Training Room has been established on the 1st floor of the CDC Building.
- 2. New-Dynamic BHU Website: It was long awaited that the individual departments could update their latest information on the webpages of their respective departments. This has become a reality with implementation of the new dynamically managed decentralized website. The old website is in the process of being abandoned, and the new website will take over soon.
- 3. Campus-wide LAN network: The Centre provides the high-speed fully manageable LAN ports in the chambers of teaching staff and offices to cater to the high speed internet connectivity required for Online classes and other academic/administrative activities.
- 4. Enhancement of leased-line Bandwidth: The Centre has enhanced NKN leased-line bandwidth from 1 Gbps to 4 Gbps apart from 2.5 Gbps of BSNL and Railtel. The Computer Centre has been able to provide additional bandwidth to the faculty members for their online academic activities.
- 5. **Training Programmes:** The Online classes need a better understanding of technologies which get utilized in the teaching learning process. The Centre has frequently organized online and offline training for the faculty members and supporting staff of the University.
- 6. Procurement of Next-Generation Firewall (NGFW): To address the issues related to Cyber Security of the University Computer Network, a new Next-Generation Firewall System has been procured and is under the final stage of commissioning.
- 7. Establishment of Network Services in RGSC Barkachha Campus: The RGSC Campus, due to its geographical location, was suffering from poor connectivity of internet services. The Computer Centre jointly with the team of RGSC Officials has initiated a Project based on OPEX model to provide High Speed Internet Services. The Project is on its verge of procurement.

#### 11.13. HEALTH CARE SERVICES

Sir Sunderlal Hospital is a teaching and training hospital for imparting clinical teaching and training to the students of Institute of Medical Sciences. Established way back in 1926 with a bed strength

of 96 beds, it is now a modern hospital with 2070 beds. The Sir Sunderlal Hospital runs on the regular maintenance grant as well as ad-hoc development grants from University Grants Commission. Besides, it also generates a part of its own financial support in the form of Revolving Fund through its earnings from the user charges for its services from the patients.

The dispensing of modern and ayurvedic medicines are done by qualified Pharmacists.

The undersigned is directed to refer to this Department's OM No.31011/3/2018-Estt.A-IV dated 08.10.2020 regarding relaxation to travel by air to visit North East Region, Jammu & Kashmir, and Andaman & Nicobar, and to say that in relaxation to CCS (LTC) Rules, 1988, the scheme allowing Government servants to travel by air to North East Region (NER), Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir (J&K), Union Territory of Ladakh and Union Territory of Andaman & Nicobar Islands (A&N) is extended for a further period of two years, w.e.f. 26th September, 2022 till 25th September, 2024.

- 2. The above Special Dispensation Concession is subject to the following terms & conditions:
  - (i) All eligible Government servants may avail LTC to visit any place in NER/A&N/J&K/Ladakh against the conversion of their one Home Town LTC in a four years' block period.
  - (ii) Government servants, whose Home Town and Headquarters/ place of posting are same, they are not allowed the conversion of any Home Town LTC as they are not eligible for the Home Town LTC facility.
  - (iii) The Government servant whose Home Town is situated in NER/A&N/J&K/Ladakh will also be allowed conversion of Home Town LTC for availing this Scheme to visit any place in any one of the three regions out of the above mentioned four regions except the region wherein his/her Hometown is situated.

No. 31011/3/2018-Estt.A-IV dated 20.09.2018 regarding relaxation to travel by air to visit North East Region, Jammu & Kashmir and Andaman & Nicobar and to say that in relaxation to CCS (LTC) Rules, 1988, the scheme allowing Government servants to travel by air to North East Region (NER), Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir (J&K), Union Territory of Ladakh and Union Territory of Andaman & Nicobar Islands (A&N) is extended for a further period of two years, w.e.f. 26<sup>th</sup> September, 2020 till 25<sup>th</sup> September, 2022 as under:

- (i) LTC for visiting NER, J&K, Ladakh and A&N in lieu of a Home Town LTC.
- (ii) Facility of air journey to non-entitled Government servants for visiting NER, J&K, Ladakh and A&N.
- (iii) Permission to undertake journey to J&K, Ladakh, NER and A&N by private airlines.
- 2. The above special dispensation is subject to the following terms & conditions:
  - (i) All eligible Government servants may avail LTC to visit any place in NER/ A&N/ J&K/ Ladakh against the conversion of their one Home Town LTC in a four year block.
  - (ii) Government servants, whose Home Town and Headquarters/ place of posting is the same, are not allowed the conversion.
  - (iii) Fresh Recruits are allowed conversion of one of the three Home Town LTCs in a block of four years, applicable to them to visit NER/ A&N/ J&K/ Ladakh. They are also allowed one additional conversion of Home Town LTC to visit UT of J&K/ UT of Ladakh in a block of four years.
  - (iv) Government servants entitled to travel by air may avail this concession from their Headquarters in their entitled class of air by any airlines subject to the maximum fare limit of LTC-80.
  - (v) Government servants not entitled to travel by air are allowed to travel by air in Economy class by any airlines subject to the maximum fare limit of LTC-80 in the following sectors:

contd...2/-

- (a) Between Kolkata/Guwahati and any place in NER.
- (b) Between Kolkata/Chennai/Visakhapatnam and Port Blair.
- (c) Between Delhi/Amritsar and any place in J&K/Ladakh.

Journey for these non-entitled employees from their Headquarters up to Kolkata/Guwahati/ Chennai/ Visakhapatnam/ Delhi/ Amritsar shall be undertaken as per their entitlement.

- (vi) Air travel by Government employees to NER, J&K, Ladakh and A&N as mentioned in para (iv) and (v) above is allowed whether they avail the concession against Anywhere in India LTC or in lieu of the Home Town LTC, as permitted.
- (vii) As regards the settlement of LTC cases where a non-entitled Government employee travels directly by air from his Headquarters to the destination in NER/ J&K/ Ladakh/ A&N, the clarification issued vide DoPT's O.M. No. 31011/3/2018-Estt.A-IV dated 20.06.2019 may also be referred to.
- (viii) Air tickets are to be purchased directly from the airlines (Booking counters, website of airlines) or by utilizing the service of Authorized Travel Agents viz. 'M/s Balmer Lawrie & Company', 'M/s Ashok Travels & Tours' and 'IRCTC' [to the extent IRCTC is authorized as per DoPT's O.M. No. 31011/6/2002- Estt.(A) dated 02.12.2009] while undertaking LTC journey. Booking of tickets through other agencies is not permitted and no request for relaxation of rules for booking the tickets through such agencies shall be considered by this Department.
- 3. Efforts should be made by the Government servants to book air tickets at the cheapest fare possible. All the Ministries/ Departments are advised to bring it to the notice of all their employees that any misuse of LTC will be viewed seriously and the employees will be liable for appropriate action under the rules. In order to keep a check on any kind of misuse of LTC, Ministries/ Departments are advised to randomly get some of the air tickets submitted by the officials verified from the airlines concerned with regard to the actual cost of air travel vis-a-vis the cost indicated on the air tickets submitted by the officials.

4. In their application to the persons belonging to Indian Audit and Accounts Department, these orders are issued under Article 148(5) of the Constitution and after consultation with the Comptroller & Auditor General of India.

- (iv) Fresh Recruits are also allowed conversion of one of the three Home Town LTCs in a block of four years, applicable to them to visit NER/A&N/ J&K/Ladakh. In addition, they are allowed one additional conversion of Home Town LTC to visit UT of J&K/ UT of Ladakh in a block of four years.
- (v) Government servants entitled to travel by air may avail this concession from their Headquarters in their entitled class of air by any airlines subject to the terms and conditions as enumerated in DoPT's OM. No. 31011/12/2022-Estt.A-IV dated 29.08.2022 (copy enclosed).
- (vi) Government servants not entitled to travel by air are allowed to travel by air in Economy class by any airlines subject to the terms and conditions as enumerated in DoPT's OM dated 29.08.2022 in the following sectors:-
- (a) Between Kolkata/Guwahati and any place in NER.
- (b) Between Kolkata/Chennai/Visakhapatnam and Port Blair.
- (c) Between Delhi/Amritsar and any place in J&K/Ladakh.

Journey for these non-entitled employees from their Headquarters upto Kolkata/ Guwahati/Chennai /Visakhapatnam/Delhi/ Amritsar shall be undertaken as per their entitlement.

- (vii) Air travel by Government employees to NER, J&K, Ladakh and A&N as mentioned in para (v) and (vi) above is allowed whether they avail the concession against Anywhere in India LTC or in lieu of the Home Town LTC, as permitted.
- (viii) Government servants not entitled to travel by air are also allowed to travel by air in Economy class by any airlines to any place in NER/A&N/J&K/Ladakh from their Headquarters directly, however, the reimbursement will be subject to the conditions as enumerated in DoPT's OM No. 31011/12/2022-Estt.A-IV dated 29.08.2022.
- (ix) The instructions regarding booking of air tickets through authorized travel agents, best available fares, slots, booking time, advances, reimbursement, etc., as mentioned in DoPT's OM No. 31011/12/2022-Estt.A-IV dated 29.08.2022 will also be applicable for this Special Dispensation Scheme.

- 3. All the Ministries/Departments are advised to bring it to the notice of all their employees that any misuse of LTC will be viewed seriously and the employees will be liable for appropriate action under the rules. In order to keep a check on any kind of misuse of LTC, Ministries/Departments are advised to randomly get some of the air tickets submitted by the officials verified from the airlines concerned with regard to the actual cost of air travel vis-a-vis the cost indicated on the air tickets submitted by the officials.
- 4. In so far as applicability of this extended scheme to the persons belonging to Indian Audit and Accounts Department is concerned, a separate communication will be issued after the comments/concurrence from the O/o C&AG is received as mandated under Article 148(5) of the Constitution of India.

#### 2.6 CAG & PAC paras [F No. 1/6/2011- IR dt. 15.4.2013]

CAG and PAC paras and the action taken reports (ATRs) after these have been laid on the table of both houses of the parliament.

Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) of India submit three annual audit reports before the President who lay it before each house of the Indian Parliament. These reports are examined by the Public Accounts Committee (PAC) which is Financial Committee, a type of Standing Committee.

Outstanding utilisation certificates 50877 UCs for Rs 511.37 crore prior to 1989-90 were outstanding as on 31.3.99. 3.51 lakh UGC provides 'Maintenance Grant' for salary of teaching and non-teaching staff and maintenance of building, equipment etc. to Central Universities, 13 Deemed Universities and Colleges of DU and Banaras Hindu University (BHU). The Development Grant is provided to improve the infrastructure and basic facilities in all the Universities. UGC disbursed Rs 5055.53 crore as maintenance grant and Rs 2719.82 crore as development assistance grant (under various schemes) during 1992-93 to 2000-01 (Appendix VIII and IX). According to the prescribed procedure each grantee institution was required to submit periodical progress reports and a statement of expenditure to UGC. On the basis of recommendations of PAC in its 73rd Report (Sixth Lok Sabha) it was decided to constitute peripatetic parties for on the spot liquidation of outstanding utilization. However, no peripatetic party was constituted as of July 2000. As many as 50877 utilisation certificates (UCs) involving Rs 511.37 crore pertaining to the period 1958-59 to 1988-89 were outstanding as on 31 March 1999. UGC failed to provide updated information as the details are yet to be compiled. In order to ensure timely receipt of UCs UGC, in September 1993, revised the procedure by stipulating a condition that further instalment of grants should be released only after obtaining UCs from that institution. It was also underlined that the sanctioning authority would not sanction any grant unless the entry regarding receipt of UCs relating to earlier sanctions/disbursements etc. had been made in the Grants-in-Aid register. It was, however, observed that 11 divisions of UGC did not maintain any Grants-in-aid register.

Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi 8.2 Undue favour to firm of 2.44 crore Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi gave undue favour to a private firm by changing the terms of payment, in contravention of the tender terms, which has resulted in short realisation of variable monthly licence fee of 2.44 crore. #### **Ministry of Human Resource Development (Now Ministry of Education)**

Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi gave undue favour to a private firm by changing the terms of payment, in contravention of the tender terms, which has resulted in short realisation of variable monthly licence fee of `2.44 crore. (*Paragraph No. 8.2*) Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi

#### 8.1 Undue favour to firm of `2.44 crore

Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi gave undue favour to a private firm by changing the terms of payment, in contravention of the tender terms, which has resulted in short realisation of variable monthly licence fee of

**2.44** crore.

With a view to setting up a 24 hour Medicine & Chemist Shop at Sir Sunderlal Hospital, Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi (SS Hospital) under the licencing agreement, Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi (BHU) invited tender.

(February 2013) from the eligible firms. As per clause 5.1 of the tender documents, the licence shall, in addition to fixed monthly licence fee of 12.50 lakh per month, pay an additional variable monthly licence fee to BHU. The bidders would be required to quote the percentage of monthly sale volume (on MRP) that they wish to pass on to BHU as additional variable monthly licence fee which will be over and above the fixed monthly licence fee fixedby BHU.

In pursuance of the tender, two firms *viz*. M/s Helpline Pharmacy, New Delhi (first firm) and M/s Umang Cure Pvt. Ltd, Lucknow (second firm) submitted their bids. As per minutes of the tender committee (30 March 2013), the first firm quoted to pay four *per cent* of monthly sale volume (on MRP) to BHU and second firm quoted 2.15 *per cent* of monthly sale volume (on MRP). The committee recommended awarding the contract to the first firm on the basis of the higher offer made by the first firm. The contract was awarded to the firstfirm and they were asked (May 2013) to send the draft Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) immediately for processing the matter further. A reminder was also given (June, 2013) to the firm but the first firm did not respond.

The first firm did not turn up to sign the contract agreement. In the meantime, the second firm approached (June 2013) BHU and requested that their bid may be accepted. Further, the second firm agreed (July 2013) to raise the percentage of variable monthly licence fee from 2.15 *per cent* to four *per cent* on monthly sale volume. BHU accepted the proposal and entered into an agreement (September 2013) with the second firm. The shop was handed over to the firmin October 2013.

Audit examination of the agreement entered by BHU with the second firm revealed that the clause for payment of variable monthly licence fee was changed in the agreement. As per tender documents, the variable monthly licence fee would be paid by the firm to BHU on monthly sale volume (on MRP) basis but in the agreement the same was changed to monthly sale volume (on sale invoice value) basis. It was seen that BHU had not negotiated with the firm to change the terms of payment and the basis for change of the terms of payment of variable monthly licence fee was also not on record. It is pertinent to mention that BHU had earlier also entered into a similar agreement in August 2007 for the same shop with another firm which also contained the clause for payment of variable monthly licence fee on monthly sale volume (on MRP) basis. Due to change of terms of payment, BHU suffered a short realisation of variable monthly licence fee of `2.44 crore during November 2013 to March 2019 as given in **Table No. 1**.

In response (December 2018), BHU stated (February 2019) that the MoU was vetted by the Coordinator, Legal Cell and duly approved by the then Vice Chancellor. The reply of the BHU is not acceptable as deviation from tender terms which have impacted the revenue of the BHU should not have been made without proper justification on record. Further, at the time of vetting of agreement, the Legal Cell did not mention the above changes in its approval note.

The Matter was reported (June 2019 and October 2020) to Ministry; their reply was awaited (December 2020). Thus, undue favour was given by to a private firm by changing the terms of payments in contravention of the tender terms which has resulted in shortrealisation of variable monthly licence fee of Rs.2.44 crore. It is recommended that an inquiry may be instituted to identify officials responsible for violation and suitable action taken.

#### Article 148 - Comptroller and Auditor-General of India

- ➤ There shall be a Comptroller and Auditor-General of India who shall be appointed by the President by warrant under his hand and seal and shall only be removed from office in like manner and on like grounds as a Judge of the Supreme Court.
- ➤ Every person appointed to be the Comptroller and Auditor-General of India shall, before he enters upon his office, make and subscribe before the President or some person appointed in that behalf by him, an oath or affirmation according to the form set out for the purpose in the Third Schedule.
- ➤ The salary and other conditions of service of the Comptroller and Auditor-General shall be such as may be determined by Parliament by law and, until they are so determined, shall be as specified in the Second Schedule: Provided that neither the salary of a Comptroller and Auditor-General nor his rights in respect of leave of absence, pension or age of retirement shall be varied to his disadvantage after his appointment.
- ➤ The Comptroller and Auditor-General shall not be eligible for further office either under the Government of India or under the Government of any State after he has ceased to hold his office.
- ➤ Subject to the provisions of this Constitution and of any law made by parliament, the conditions of service of persons serving in the Indian Audit and Accounts Department and the administrative powers of the Comptroller and Auditor-General shall be such as may be prescribed by rules made by the President after consultation with the Comptroller and Auditor-General.
- ➤ The administrative expenses of the office of the Comptroller and Auditor-General including all salaries, allowances and pensions payable to or in respect of persons serving in that office, shall be charged upon the Consolidated Fund of India.

#### Article 149 - Duties and Powers of the Comptroller and Auditor-General

The Comptroller and Auditor-General shall perform such duties and exercise such powers in relation to the accounts of the Union and of the States and of any other authority or body as may be prescribed by or under any law made by Parliament and, until provision in that behalf is so made, shall perform such duties and exercise such powers in relation to the accounts of the Union and of the States as were conferred on or exercisable by the Auditor-General of India immediately before the commencement of this Constitution in relation to the accounts of the Dominion of India and of the provinces respectively.

#### **Article 150 - Form of Accounts of The Union and of The States**

The accounts of the Union and of the States shall be kept in such form as the President may, on the advice of the Comptroller and Auditor-General of India, prescribe.

#### **Article 151 - Audit Reports**

The reports of the Comptroller and Auditor-General of India relating to the accounts of the Union shall be submitted to the president, who shall cause them to be laid before each House of Parliament. The reports of the Comptroller and Auditor-General of India relating to the accounts of a State shall be submitted to the Governor of the State, who shall cause them to be laid before the Legislature of the State.

#### Article 279 - Calculation of "net proceeds", etc.

In the foregoing provisions of this Chapter, "net proceeds" means in relation to any tax or duty the proceeds thereof reduced by the cost of collection, and for the purposes of those provisions the net proceeds of any tax or duty, or of any part of any tax or duty, in or attributable to any area shall be ascertained and certified by the Comptroller and Auditor-General of India, whose certificate shall be final. Subject as aforesaid, and to any other express provision of this Chapter, a law made by Parliament or an order of the President may, in any case where under this Part the proceeds of any duty or tax are, or may be, assigned to any State, provide for the manner in which the proceeds are to be calculated, for the time from or at which and the manner in which any payments are to be made, for the making of adjustments between one financial year and another, and for any other incidental or ancillary matters. The Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) who is the head of Supreme Audit Institution of India (SAI India) discharges his constitutional functions through the Indian Audit and Accounts Department. The Constitution of India provides for the Comptroller and Auditor General of India who is appointed by the President of India by warrant under his hand and seal. The Constitution provides that the salary and other conditions of service as well as the duties and powers of CAG may be determined by Parliament by law. In pursuance of these provisions, the Parliament enacted the CAG's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 (DPC Act) to determine the conditions of service of the CAG and to prescribe his duties and powers. In exercise of powers conferred by the DPC Act, as amended from time to time, the CAG framed the Regulations on Audit and Accounts, 2007, which provide the overarching governance framework for both accounting and auditing functions. The CAG's Auditing Standards constitute the next layer of the audit governance framework and set out the professional standards of auditing for the organisation as well as for its personnel - the individual auditors. As an ongoing initiative for continuous improvement and benchmarking, these standards are periodically reviewed, restructured and updated. CBCS guidelines (to be effective from 2015-16) provide for standardised letter grades, corresponding grade points, uniform method for calculation of semester grade point average and cumulative grade point average and a consolidated transcript format to indicate a student's performance in each semester. Universities like Banaras Hindu University (BHU) adopted grading system in faculty of Science from 2009-10 and in faculty of Commerce from 2010-11 for evaluation of students and also to enhance interaction and participation of the students. Ministry of Human Resource Development Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi, Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad and Indian Institute of Management, Kolkata, paid higher rates of interest to GPF/CPF subscribers in contravention of extant orders resulting in overpayment of Rs. 6.28 crore. (Paragraph No. 12.4) Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi, Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad, and Indian Institute of Management, Kolkata 12.4 Overpayment of interest to the GPF/CPF subscribers Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi, Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad and Indian Institute of Management, Kolkata, paid higher rates of interest to GPF/ CPF subscribers in contravention of extant orders resulting in overpayment of Rs. 6.28 crore. The Ministry of Human Resource Development Department (MHRD), Government of India, in consultation with the Ministry of Finance, instructed (February 2004) all autonomous organizations under its jurisdiction not to pay interest to General Provident Fund (GPF)/ Contributory Provident Fund (CPF) subscribers at a rate higher than that notified by the Government. However, a lesser rate of interest than the rate notified could be paid depending upon the financial position of the organization. Audit noticed that Banaras Hindu University (BHU), Varanasi, and the Indian Institutes of Management at Ahmedabad (IIM-A) and Kolkata (IIM-C) paid interest on GPF/CPF accumulations at rates higher than the notified rates fixed by the Central Government. This resulted in over-payment of interest of Rs. 6.28 crore for the

- The accounts, when audited, shall be published in the Official Gazette and a copy of the accounts, together with the auditor's reports, shall be 2[submitted 3\*\*\* to the Visitor].
- A copy of the accounts, together with the auditor's report, shall also be submitted to the Central Government, which shall, as soon as may be, cause the same to be laid before both Houses of Parliament.]

Seniority list of the applicants for University residential quarter (on the basis of date of joining) is prepared twice in a year first on 31<sup>st</sup> January and second on 31<sup>st</sup> July on the basis of applications received between 16<sup>th</sup> July to 15<sup>th</sup> January and 16<sup>th</sup> January to 15<sup>th</sup> July, respectively.
- 3. The validity of an application is only upto 3 years. In case, the applicant is not offered any quarter during these 3 years, he/she may apply to Estates Office to renew the application for the next 3 years.
- 4. An applicant can not apply for a quarter below his entitled grade of his initial appointment in the University. However, if the applicant is promoted to the next higher grade, he/she may apply for one grade below quarter.
- 5. An employee can apply for change of quarters at any time after occupation of allotted quarters but only one change in each type of quarter shall be permitted. All such applications shall be considered along with the names in the panel for allotment of accommodation as and when the particular residence falls vacant for allotment. It shall be allotted to the senior most applicant in the panel for allotment along with the other applicants in the panel for the change of residence. Application for change of quarter of only those applicants will be considered who have clearly mentioned the Qtr. No. & Colony (vacant/to be vacated) in column No. 18(i).
- 6. If an applicant is offered a quarter but he/she refuses to accept the quarter, he/she will be debarred from allotment of quarter for 1 year on the first instance and 3 years on the second instance.
- 7. If the applicant or his/her family members owns a house within the area of Varanasi Municipal Corporation or within the radius of 8 Km. from the University campus in rural area, he/she will not be eligible for allotment of University quarter.
- 8. "Family" in the context of these rules means husband or wife as the case may be and shall include sons/daughters (including step-children, legally adopted children) parents provided they are living with the employee and their names have been enlisted as dependents family members for LTC/Medical benefit of the University.

#### 12.3.3 Conclusion

Thus, implementation of the scheme by ERO-UGC was marked by non-adherence to the extant scheme guidelines which resulted in release of financial assistance of  $\mathbb{Z}$  9.91 crore without ensuring compliance with the stipulated requirements as well as excess release of  $\mathbb{Z}$  56.11 lakh. Delay was endemic at every stage of project approval and execution with delays ranging upto nearly 10 years. Completion of 22 projects were delayed while 31 projects were yet to be completed even after delays ranging upto over nine years from the stipulated date of completion. Two hostels created at a cost of  $\mathbb{Z}$  2.30 crore remained unutilised for more than three years.

The matter was reported to the Ministry (July 2017); its reply was awaited (December 2017).

#### 12.4 Overpayment of interest to the GPF/CPF subscribers

Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi, Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad and Indian Institute of Management, Kolkata, paid higher rates of interest to GPF/ CPF subscribers in contravention of extant orders resulting in overpayment of ₹ 6.28 crore.

The Ministry of Human Resource Development Department (MHRD), Government of India, in consultation with the Ministry of Finance, instructed (February 2004) all autonomous organizations under its jurisdiction not to pay interest to General Provident Fund (GPF)/ Contributory Provident Fund (CPF) subscribers at a rate higher than that notified by the Government. However, a lesser rate of interest than the rate notified could be paid depending upon the financial position of the organization.

Audit noticed that Banaras Hindu University (BHU), Varanasi, and the Indian Institutes of Management at Ahmedabad (IIM-A) and Kolkata (IIM-C) paid interest on GPF/CPF accumulations at rates higher than the notified rates fixed by the Central Government. This resulted in over-payment of interest of ₹ 6.28 crore for the years 2010-11 to 2016-17 as detailed in **Table No. 4** below:

**10.11** Official language inspection of State Unit: Sikkim, Gangtok Office was done by the Hon'ble Parliamentary Committee on 31.12.2021. The committee, expressed satisfaction over the status of official language implementation in the office and appreciated our achievements.

## Implementation Measures of Official Language Policy

**10.12** In order to ensure the compliance and implementation of the Official Language Policy, in addition to various incentive schemes, workshops are also organized from time to time in the Ministry. In view of the convenience of working in Hindi, all the computers of the office have been made Unicode enable and commonly used administrative terminology, abbreviations, dictionary etc. have been made available bilingual on the ministry website.

#### **Training, Workshops and Seminars**

10.13 Geological Survey of India, Central Headquarters organized "All India Scientific and Technical Rajbhasha Seminar and All India Annual Rajbhasha Review Meeting and Hindi Workshop" from 16 to 18 November 2021 in Northern Region, Lucknow under the aegis of 'Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav'. The event was presided by the Director General, GSI. Prof. B. P. Singh, Banaras Hindu University, Prof. Santosh Kumar, Kumaon University and Prof. Sadanand Gupta, President, Hindi Sansthan, Uttar Pradesh graced the occasion. A total of

52 research papers from all the offices of GSI were presented in this seminar, out of these 06 best research papers were awarded. 04 keynotes were presented during the seminar by Professors of Banaras Hindu University, Kumaon University, Lucknow University and retired Deputy Director General of GSI. Along with this, Annual Raibhasha Review Meeting and Hindi workshop were organized in parallel session, in which Annual Report of Hindi for the year 2020-21 of all GSI offices as well as quarterly reports of regional offices ending September 2021 were reviewed. 04 lectures were delivered during All India Hindi Workshop by professor of Nava Nalanda University and retired officers of Dept. of Official Language and GSI.

**10.14** Hindi workshops are being organized regularly by the Geological Survey of India in compliance with the guidelines issued by the Government of India, Ministry of Home Affairs, Department of Official Language. The details of the workshops organized at the Geological Survey of India, Central Headquarters during the period are as follows:

- Hindi Workshop was organized by CHQ, Kolkata on 22.01.2021 and a total of 50 personnel were trained.
- All India Hindi workshop was organized by CHQ, Kolkata on 26.02.2021 and officials from various offices of GSI participated.

- (a) & (b): Under the provisions of section 12 of The University Grants Commission (UGC), Act, 1956 it has been stated that it shall be the general duty of the Commission to take, in consultation with the Universities or other bodies concerned, all such steps as it may think fit for the promotion and co-ordination of University education and for the determination and maintenance of standards of teaching, examination and research in Universities. Allocation and disbursement of Grants to Universities has been specified as one of the functions of the Commission in The UGC Act, 1956.
- (c): The UGC has informed that 14 Institutions have been banned by the UGC for disbursement of Grants.
- (d): The UGC has further informed that 394 Universities/Deemed to be Universities and 10360 colleges are in the UGC list under section 12 B of the UGC Act, 1956, which makes them eligible for receiving grants from the Central Government, the Commission, or any other organisation receiving any funds from the Central Government. The major beneficiaries of the grants directly disbursed by UGC are the Centrally funded HEIs which include 45 Central Universities, 08 Inter University Centres, 22 Educational Multimedia Research Centres, 04 National Facilities Centres, 66 Human Resource Development Centres, 53 Colleges of Delhi University, 04 Colleges of Banaras Hindu University, Panjab University Chandigarh, 80 identified Deemed to be Universities and 14 Scholarships/Fellowships. UGC also provides occasional grants to various Higher Educational Institutions under different schemes of UGC.

(a) to (e) Total 68559 students were residing in 575 hostel campuses in 45 Central Universities under the purview of Ministry of Education, as on 01.04.2022. The Central University wise details of number of students in the University and total number of hostel rooms are given at annexure. Hostel accommodation is provided to SC/ST/OBC students in the Central Universities as per reservation policy of Government of India. With growing number of students in the Central Universities, infrastructure for more hostels facilities is being provided. From the year 2017-2018, the Central Universities can avail funding from Higher Education Financing Agency (HEFA) for development of University infrastructure including construction of hostels.



# 1.2. Highlights of the Year

### Rankings

In the NIRF Rankings 2022, the University claimed the 6th spot among universities and the 11th position overall. It proudly holds an 'A' Grade from the NAAC, scoring 3.41 out of 4.

In the 2022-23, THE World Rankings, the University landed between 601st and 800th, while in the QS World Rankings, it secured a spot between 1001st and 1200th. According to QS subject-wise rankings, Pharmacy ranked within 251-300, Agriculture & Forestry within 301-350, Physics, Medicine, Biological Sciences, and Environmental Sciences within 401-500, and Chemistry within 501-550. During the Academic Session 2022-23, Banaras Hindu University made great strides on its way to achieving the goals of academic excellence.

#### Admissions and Convocation

The academic session 2022-23 commenced on 4th July 2022, witnessing the enrolment of 14,212 new students across a spectrum of UG, PG, Ph.D., Diploma, and Certificate courses at the university. Details regarding the distribution of male and female students across disciplines is given in Chapter 7.3. Additionally, 276 new foreign students (comprising 172 males and 104 females) were admitted to different courses, with a breakdown by country available in Chapter 7.3

The University held its 102<sup>nd</sup> Convocation on December 10, 2022. Shri Nikesh Arora, CEO of Palo Alto Network, USA, and an alumnus of the former Institute of Technology, BHU, honoured the occasion as the Chief Guest, delivering an inspiring address during the Convocation ceremony.

During the Convocation, the university conferred degrees upon 6640 undergraduates, 4887 postgraduates, and 8 M.Phil. candidates, alongside granting Ph.D. degrees to 514 candidates. Details regarding the recipients, categorized by faculty and course, can be found in Chapter-7.2.

#### Academic Achievements and Research Milestones

During the year, the University showcased remarkable academic prowess, generating over 4236 publications. This impressive output comprised 3517 research papers, with 1283 published in national journals and 2234 in international ones. Additionally, there were 699 contributions in the form of books, book chapters, monographs, and 20 manuals/leaflets (detailed in Chapter 6.1.2). In the year 2022-23, the publications from the University collectively received around 100,000 research citations and achieved an H-Index of 168. The university's researchers also filed 19 new patents (detailed in Chapter 6.1.6). BHU proudly publishes Prajna, a UGC Care-listed journal, alongside various magazines and journals across its institutes, faculties, and departments.

In the past year, faculty members succeeded in securing 137 new research projects amounting to Rs. 21.32 Crores. Additionally, ongoing projects, valued at an impressive Rs. 208.42 Crores, flourished with 637 projects (detailed in Chapter 6.1.3). These ongoing projects collectively generated a gross receipt of about Rs.50 crores. Out of the ongoing projects, the faculty members also undertook 186 projects, of consultancy nature, bringing in funds totalling Rs.9.9 crores.

At BHU, education extends far beyond the confines of classrooms. Throughout the year, various faculties and departments organized a multitude of seminars and conferences, creating a vibrant campus atmosphere welcoming delegates from across India and abroad. In the academic year 2022-23, a total of 437 conferences were hosted by different institutes, faculties, and departments (details provided in Chapter 6.1.4), serving as vital platforms for scholars and scientists to actively engage, interact, and share their academic and research initiatives. Besides, faculty members and research scholars from the university actively participated in academic events organised in different universities, colleges, and institutes both in India and overseas, presenting research papers and delivering talks. During this session, 249 teachers were on deputation (details in Chapter 6.1.5), contributing their expertise in seminars and conferences held in countries like the USA, Canada, South Africa, China, the U.K., Japan, Bhutan, Australia, Germany, among others.

Moreover, the faculty's excellence shone through as they clinched 114 national and 15 international awards and accolades during this session, recognizing their academic and professional achievements (details in Chapter 6.1.7).

#### Initiatives under IoE Scheme

Banaras Hindu University proudly holds the coveted distinction of being an Institution of Eminence (IoE), a prestigious honour conferred by the Government of India. This status grants the university a significant level of autonomy to design and implement strategies aimed at attaining academic brilliance. Upholding the University's mission, which emphasizes the pursuit of excellence in teaching and research to instil holistic values of development and sustainability, various proactive measures have been implemented under the Institution of Eminence (IoE) scheme.

The University's efforts and resources were directed towards consolidation and optimisation of its functioning by taking measures that cultivate a vibrant and enriched educational environment, and nurture platform that supports the growth of both teachers and students. Recognizing the pivotal role of teachers as the foundation of any academic institution, it becomes imperative to establish a robust system of supportive incentives, grants, and research resources for both faculty members and aspiring scholars. Throughout the year, University's priority remained on enhancing the teachinglearning experience of our students during their tenure, shaping them into well-rounded individuals. Initiatives encompass a wide spectrum, targeting various facets of educational enhancement. From bolstering research initiatives and facilitating international exposure to empowering students with scholarships, promoting interdisciplinary studies, and nurturing leadership and life skills, BHU is dedicated to creating an ecosystem conducive to comprehensive academic progress.

The ongoing focus on promoting a culture of support and empowerment emphasizes University's commitment to achieving excellence across its educational and research domains. The initiatives seeded now will grow and develop, and certainly create a livelier and more impactful academic and research environment, in the times to come, positioning the institution at the forefront of educational advancement and scholarly contributions. Notable initiatives outlined under the IoE scheme during this session include:

### Seed Grant to Newly Appointed Faculty **Members**

The University has initiated the 'Seed Grant Scheme' to offer initial financial support (ranging from Rs. 5.00 – 20.00 lakh over a period of 3 years) to newly appointed faculty members at the level of Assistant Professors. The scheme enables the newly appointed faculty members to swiftly establish essential research facilities upon their joining the University, facilitating the advancement of their academic efforts. Once these foundational facilities are in place, it is expected that these faculty members will proactively seek funding by drafting grant proposals for agencies like UGC, DST, DBT, MHRD, DAE, etc. The anticipated high-quality academic output from these faculty members should not only draw foreign students to BHU but also foster collaborations with top-ranking global universities. In the year 2022-23, 120 faculty members benefited from this scheme, raising the total beneficiaries to 352, with the University allocating over Rs. 11 crores towards this initiative.

### **Incentive Grant to Senior Faculty Members**

The University has launched an additional program named the 'Incentive Grant,' targeting senior faculty actively enhancing the University's research productivity. Based on merit, senior faculty members receive financial support ranging from Rs. 10.00 lakhs to 30.00 lakhs, aligning with their specific needs. In the fiscal year 2022-23, 10 senior faculty members availed themselves of this opportunity, elevating the total beneficiaries to 264. The University allocated over Rs. 7.5 crores toward this scheme, reinforcing its commitment to supporting and rewarding the research contributions of its senior faculty.

#### **Support for Organising Academic Events**

Financial support is being provided to the faculty members for organizing conference/ workshops/ seminars. The scheme was allocated an amount of Rs.1.5 crores during the financial year 2022-23. In the first year of inception of this scheme, 59 events have been funded with a gross financial support of about Rs.85 lakh.

### Research Quality Incentives: Encouraging **Publication and Equipment Use**

During the year 2022-23, the University initiated Credit Research Incentive program, an initiative to encourage Faculty members enhance research quality and output. To pursue their research interests, the faculty members receive a grant of Rs. 50,000 to cover user charges for usage of sophisticated equipment installed in different facilities of BHU. To extend this grant into the second year, faculty members must have at least two publications in Q1 and Q2 journals annually. During the year 2022-23, 100 faculty members benefitted from this scheme with a gross expenditure of about Rs. 7 lakh.

### **Financial Support for Professional Needs**

In the reported year, the University initiated a scheme offering a one-time Professional Development Fund (PDF) of Rs.1.20 lakh to each faculty member. This fund allows faculty members to utilize it for specific professional development purposes, such as paying membership fees for professional bodies, reimbursing travel costs linked to professional work (like presenting research at conferences or workshops), inviting academic visitors, purchasing books, devices (laptops, tablets, etc.), and covering other contingency expenses related with teaching and research. By 31st March, 2023, 264 faculty members had availed themselves of this scheme with a gross expenditure of over Rs. 2 crore.

#### Global Academic and Research Engagement

All the regular faculty members of the University are being provided partial financial support up to Rs. 50,000/- (for SAARC and ASEAN counties) and up to Rs. 1,00,000/- (for all other countries) for international travel to participate in conferences, workshops, short-training programs and academic meeting held overseas. During the financial year 2022-23, 37 faculty members benefitted from the scheme involving a gross expenditure of about Rs. 31 lakh.

The University also believes that International exposure is pivotal for Ph.D. scholars, as it offers avenues for cross-cultural learning, global networking, and enriches research experiences. To facilitate this essential aspect, the University has introduced the "International Travel Support" initiative for post-doctoral fellows and Ph.D. research scholars. This program extends partial financial assistance to postdoctoral fellows and Ph.D. scholars for their International travel needs for participation in conferences. Upto 31st March 2023, 31 postdoctoral fellows and Ph.D. scholars benefitted under the scheme involving a gross expenditure of over Rs. 14 lakh.

# Reinforcing the Academic Trajectory of PhD Scholars

To equip our Ph.D. students for an exceptional academic trajectory, the research scholars are

engaged in the university's teaching activities through the 'Teach for BHU Fellowships (TBF)' scheme. Participants in the TBF scheme are granted a fellowship of Rs. 40,000 per month along with an additional Rs. 6,000 as House Rent Allowance (HRA) throughout the 12-month duration of their engagement. In its year of inception, that is 2022-23, 47 eligible research scholars were granted TBF under the scheme involving an expenditure of over Rs.1 crore.

#### **Incentivizing Excellence**

encourage high-quality research among Ph.D. scholars holding the BHU (Non-NET) UGC Fellowship, an incentive scheme has been introduced. Scholars showcasing exemplary research performance, evident through publications in Q1 or Q2 journals listed in SCOPUS/Web of Science, receive a supplemental amount of Rs. 7000/- per month in addition to their existing fellowship for the subsequent 12 months. This extension can continue for up to 5 years, contingent upon the scholar's consistent outstanding performance in each successive year. During the year of inception of the scheme, 72 eligible Ph.D. scholars benefitted involving an expenditure of nearly Rs.60 lacs.

### Empowering Students: Student Wellbeing, Leadership and Life Skills Development Scheme

It is crucial to equip students with more than just academic knowledge; nurturing their life skills and leadership abilities is equally vital. The "Scheme for Student Wellbeing, Leadership and Life Skills Development of Students" aims to do just that. Recognizing the significance of these skills in shaping well-rounded individuals, substantial financial support has been allocated to the various Faculties within the University. This funding is specifically designated to organize an array of activities and programs aimed at enhancing students' leadership capabilities, refining their life skills, and promoting overall well-being. The initiative seeks to empower students with the necessary tools to excel not just academically, but also in their personal and professional lives. In the financial year 2022-23, the scheme was initially launched in three Faculties and the Mahila Mahavidyalaya, starting with an allocation of Rs. 2 crores.

#### **Enhancing Employability**

The University has introduced the 'Dr. Sarvepalli

Radhakrishnan Internship' for postgraduate passouts in various disciplines such as Library Science / Computer Science, Education, Physical Education, Visual Arts, and Performing Arts. This initiative aims to offer professional exposure and enhance employability. Interns are placed in relevant domains within the University and receive a stipend of Rs. 20,000 per month. During the year 2022-23, 76 SRK interns were inducted for their internship tenure, with Rs. 40 lakh as value of gross expenditure booked under the scheme. As success of the scheme is visible, it is likely to be enlarged during the coming year.

### **Internationalisation of Campus**

The internationalization of universities presents an invaluable opportunity to elevate the teachinglearning environment and profoundly benefit both faculty members and students. It serves as a gateway to a more enriched and diverse educational experience for students. Exposure to international perspectives, cultures, and academic approaches fosters a dynamic learning environment that goes beyond textbooks. Interacting with students from different parts of the world broadens their worldview, encourages critical thinking, and promotes crosscultural understanding. This exposure not only enhances academic learning but also cultivates valuable life skills such as adaptability, empathy, and communication. It prepares students to thrive in a globalized world, equipping them with a deeper understanding of diverse perspectives and a competitive edge in the increasingly interconnected global landscape. With a view to attract more and more international students, following schemes have been instituted:

#### Malaviya Postdoctoral Fellowship

The Malaviya Postdoctoral Fellowship caters to Foreign Nationals, PIOs, and OCIs across Sciences, Social Sciences, Humanities, and professional disciplines. With a total of 100 positions available, the fellowship spans a duration of 3 years, extendable by another 2 years subject to a favorable evaluation by the relevant review committee. Eligible candidates hold a Ph.D. from the top 500 Institutions (THE or QS ranking) with an outstanding academic track record or possess three years of postdoctoral experience from the same top-ranked institutions. Additional eligibility condition for consideration under the scheme include, proven demonstration of independent research prowess and publications in high-impact journals. Recipients receive a monthly fellowship of Rs. 1.00 lakh (approximately \$1500 per month) and are entitled to an annual research grant of Rs. 3.00 lakh. During the year 2022-23, 17 new Malaviya PDFs were appointed raising the total expenditure under the scheme to Rs. 2.5 crores.

#### **International Student Scholarships**

The university has introduced a scholarship program aimed at attracting more international students. This initiative ensures that all international students receive a monthly scholarship of Rs. 6,000 as part of the scheme. About Rs.35 lakh was spent on this initiative during the year.

#### **Other Student-Centric Initiatives**

Students represent the invaluable assets of any academic institution, and the university prioritizes their growth through a spectrum of student-centric activities held year-round. Some of the activities are highlighted below:

- Structures have been put in place to prioritize students' mental health and stress management. The University has a Counseling Cell managed by educators from the Psychology Psychiatry Department, offering counseling services. Trained students also extend counseling support to their fellow peers. Additionally, a dedicated Mental Health Well Being Committee, comprising nine qualified members, concentrates on addressing students' mental health needs. The committee's purpose and operations have been communicated to students, and their helpline numbers and contact information have been widely circulated for easy access when required.
- The University has a robust system of providing career guidance and placement support. The University's Career Development Centre, aims to enhance students' overall career prospects and personality growth. It provides educational opportunities and resources to foster careeroriented mindsets, guiding students in exploring, planning, and preparing for their careers. Through assessments, technology, educational activities, professional development, counselling, the Centre helps students align their academic and career goals. Its activities includeproviding details on professional development courses, higher studies in India and abroad, assisting students in discovering strengths and

All these units have started functioning.

The Trauma Centre of the Banaras Hindu University is the biggest Trauma Centre of the country. It has 334 beds with 27 bedded modern ICU, centrally air-conditioned with centralized distribution of

gases & vacuum with 10,000 litre liquid oxygen plant, 13 modular operation theatres, Outdoor facility (Orthopedics, Plastic Surgery, Neurosurgery) and indoor facility (Neurosurgery, Orthopedics, Plastic Surgery, Poly-trauma and Emergency), 24 hour emergency services, ATLS & ACLS trained personnel, Advanced resuscitation equipment, Round –the- clock imaging facility (128 slice CT scan, 1.5 T MRI, USG, X-ray), blood bank facilities, 225 seats modern auditorium for academic activities and 24 hour ambulance services.

# 6.1.3. MAJOR PROJECTS UNDERTAKEN

During the academic session 2022-23, 137 new research projects with total grants exceeding Rs. 2131.87 lacs were sanctioned. Simultaneously, 637 ongoing projects (total grants more than Rs. 20842.22 lakhs) continued and made progress. Several major funding agencies of the country have provided support to BHU for research work as per details given in Annexure 2.

# 6.1.4. CONFERENCE / SEMINARS / WORKSHOPS ORGANISED

In order to provide faculty members and students forum to share their knowledge, experiences and research findings in various subject areas and to facilitate in academic interactions, many Departments / Centres/ Faculties organized several academic meets during the Academic Session 2022-23. In total 437 Conferences were organized at BHU during the session 2022-23, which were well attended by the outstation participants. ### 8.1. HOSPITAL AND HEALTH CARE **CENTRES**

Sir Sunder Lal Hospital is a teaching and training hospital for imparting education of medicine and nursing to the students of Institute of Medical Sciences. Established way back in 1926 with a bed strength of 96 beds, it is now a modern hospital with 2614 beds. It has three full-fledged wings namely-Modern Medicine, Ayurvedic and Dental. The Trauma Centre was established in 2008 with the aim of providing world class emergency medical care to the people of Varanasi and its surrounding areas. It is one of the most advanced trauma centres of the country and equipped with the latest technology to handle a wide range of trauma and medical emergencies. The Ayurvedic medical treatment is one of the best in India for treating patients with the insight of rich traditional knowledge system. Sir Sunder Lal Hospital runs on the regular maintenance grant as well as ad-hoc development grants from the University Grants Commission. Besides, it also generates a part of its own financial support in the form of Revolving Fund through its earnings from the user charges for its services from the patients. Due to the cost-effective and precise treatment it happens to be one of the most demanded and crowded hospitals of the country.

#### University Students Health Care Complex

The University has a dynamic as well as flexible comprehensive health care delivery system for all the students viz. hostellers as well as day scholars. Day to day health care facilities are extended to them through an independent unit named University Students Health Care Complex, throughout the year except on holidays on line with the working schedule of Sir Sunderlal Hospital.

Services Rendered by the Centre are as follows:

- a. Clinical Facilities
- b. Laboratory Services
- c. Other services like medical fitness certificate, local purchase of emergency medicines, medical claim reimbursement on indoor basis etc.

#### University Employee Health Care Complex

The University Employee Health Care Complex caters to the primary medical needs of the regular and superannuated employees and their dependants. It also provides medical facilities to the resident doctors of Sir Sunder Lal Hospital and the staff of Kendriya Vidyalaya BHU Campus.

Presently, approximately 1,35,280 beneficiaries are enrolled in the University Employee Health Care Complex and during the current session 2022-23, a large number of patients are benefitted from its services provided by 6 consultants. The dispensing of modern and ayurvedic medicines are done by qualified pharmacists.

#### 8.2. ESTATE OFFICE

The Banaras Hindu University was established as a residential university where teachers, students and other employees share a composite life as an academic community. In pursuance of this objective, along with hostels for students, residential houses have also been built for lodging of teachers and other employees. Presently, 960 teaching staff quarters and 695 non teaching staff quarters are available. Besides, newly constructed 160 teaching staff quarters are under finalization and will be available for allotment in coming month.

#### 8.3. COMPUTER CENTRE

The Computer Centre at Banaras Hindu University (BHU) stands as a central hub for cutting-edge computing resources and services, functioning tirelessly to cater to the diverse needs of the university community. Operating around the clock, this state-of-the-art facility has become an integral part of BHU's technological infrastructure, offering a comprehensive array of services.

### **Core Services**

At the heart of its operations, the Computer Centre provides essential services that form the backbone of modern academic and administrative functions. These services include ubiquitous Internet access, World Wide Web (WWW) connectivity, and email facilities. The Centre also facilitates video conferencing, a crucial tool for virtual collaboration and communication in today's interconnected academic world. Furthermore, it takes charge of maintaining the university's official website (www.bhu.ac.in) and managing the web servers, ensuring seamless online presence and information dissemination. The responsibility extends to the maintenance of critical services like DNS and the optical fiber network, crucial for the stability and efficiency of the university's digital infrastructure. The Centre also plays a pivotal role in user authentication services, securing access to sensitive information and systems including library.

### 10. SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTS

Banaras Hindu University (BHU) being a Central University gets substantial annual budgetary support as grant in aid from Central Government through regular budget. Presently the Maintenance expenditure as well as Development expenditure are met by grants received from U.G.C. under "OH-31 (Recurring General)", "OH-36 (Recurring General) and "OH-35 (Non-Recurring) - Capital / Infrastructure" respectively. The University's internal resources are generated by way of receipts

from students fee, income from properties, dairy and agriculture farm, hospital, Licence fee from shops, income from sale of Ayurvedic drugs etc. The annual accounts of the University for the year 2022-23 is already finalized and the same have been approved by the Finance Committee.
